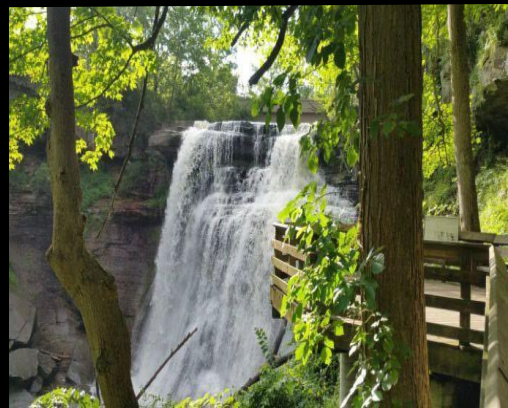

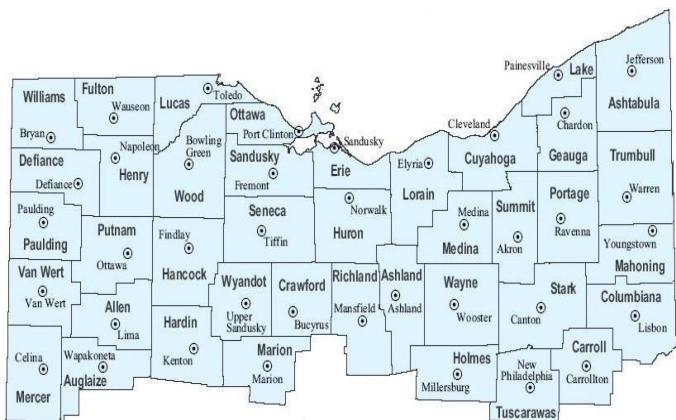

WHY APPLY?

This is an exciting opportunity for anyone with a heart for public service and an interest in criminal law to join a dedicated team of professionals in one of the most vibrant locations in the country, Northeast Ohio! Located on the shores of Lake Erie, not only does Cleveland and our surrounding locations offer professional sports, but

Our Capital Habeas Unit (CHU) focuses on the representation of State prisoners sentenced to death who have exhausted their claims through the State court appellate processes and who are seeking final review of their claims in federal habeas corpus. Our habeas representation covers all stages of representation in federal court from the initial petition through the Circuit and Supreme Court stages of appeal and State clemency.

WHAT WE DO

The Office of the Federal Public Defender for the Northern District of Ohio zealously represents and defends indigent citizens in order to preserve, protect and defend the principle of equal justice for all.

We do this in accordance with the Criminal Justice Act. We provide representation to individuals in federal criminal cases or under federal criminal investigation who are financially unable to retain counsel.



WHO WE ARE

We are attorneys, paralegals, investigators, office administrators, information technology specialists, and mitigation specialists, dedicated to defending our fellow citizens by providing them with legal counsel. We are zealous advocates for our clients, providing independent trial defense services free from outside influence. We represent every client within the guidelines of the laws, consistent with our professional ethics, and in accordance with all applicable rules of practice. We work together as a team of legal professionals to uphold every person's right to be presumed innocent, and when required to a fair sentence. Our defense is vigorous at trial, sentencing, on appeal. We advocate for humane sentences by showing judges and prosecutors that we represent people, not criminals.

We are committed to cultivating a culture of acceptance and connectedness that honors the diverse backgrounds of the people we represent. We value diversity and believe better legal representation occurs when members of the defense team have diverse backgrounds. We seek out and embrace the unique contributions that you can bring, including your culture, ethnicity, education, opinions, race, sex, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, nation of origin, age, languages spoken, veteran's status, religion, disability, or economic status.





THE ORGANIZATION

Established in August of 1973, the Office of the Federal Public Defender for the Northern District of Ohio operates four offices, including a main office in downtown Cleveland and branch offices in Akron, Youngstown, and Toledo. Our staff of 51 employees is split between the Trial Unit, performing traditional indigent criminal defense and appeals, and the Capital Habeas Unit, providing post-conviction representation to inmates sentenced to death. There are currently 22 Capital Habeas Units throughout the country. Our CHU was opened in 2008 with a staff of two attorneys and a paralegal. It has grown to a Unit currently comprised of 14 members, including five Assistant Federal Public Defenders, two Research and Writing Specialist Attorneys, two Mitigation Specialist, two investigators, and three Paralegals.

WHO YOU ARE

You thrive in high-stakes, complex legal environments and bring exceptional writing, research and oral advocacy skills. You are collaborative by nature, able to work effectively as part of an interdisciplinary team, and comfortable navigating both the emotional weight and intellectual rigor of capital work. A minimum of 3-years criminal litigation and/or appellate experience is preferred. Federal court experience or clerkship is desirable. You are trustworthy and reliable with good judgment and initiative.

As a CHU Research & Writing Specialist Attorney you have a demonstrated commitment to working with marginalized communities and with clients from a range of backgrounds. You put the client first while standing on your values, your personal and professional ethics, and your professionalism. You use sound judgment to carry out your responsibilities. You appreciate the importance of diversity. You possess strong client-centered instincts, treating every client with dignity, empathy, and humanity. You are resilient, reflective and grounded in your purpose—committed to continuous learning, high professional standards, and advocacy that makes a difference. You are

candid in your advice, but respectful of others. You don't just recognize problems but identify solutions. You harness your creativity, legal acumen, and writing skills to overcome difficult problem sets.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF A CHU RESEARCH & WRITING SPECIALIST ATTORNEY

If selected as Research & Writing Specialist Attorney in our Capital Habeas Unit, you will work collaboratively with a team of other Assistant Federal Public Defenders, Research and Writing Specialist Attorneys, Investigators, Mitigation Specialist, and Paralegals. While training is available, the selected candidate will be expected to quickly assume a large caseload, so prior capital litigation or state postconviction experience is preferable. In general, the ideal candidate will demonstrate capability and qualifications in the following areas:

- The initiative, judgement, and integrity to operate and think independently, while still working cooperatively as part of a team.
- Demonstrate good interoffice communication skills.
- The ability to research and draft capital habeas petitions and motions in federal district courts.
- Advocating in hearings and oral arguments.
- Assisting in the development of fact and mitigation investigations.
- Bringing a creative and committed approach to research and writing to address the historical significance of capital punishment and its ongoing relationship to race and slavery.
- Participating in creative narratives and video productions for state clemency.
- Demonstrated skills working one on one with clients accused of capital offenses.
- Demonstrated skills and ability to provide zealous, professional legal representation to indigent clients.
- Demonstrated ability to communicate professionally and effectively with the Court and opposing Counsel.
- The ability to review voluminous discovery.
- Serving as a resource to CJA panel attorneys, including planning and presenting Capital Habeas Seminars for the defense community.





IDEAL CANDIDATE

Education and Experience

To qualify, interested persons must have graduated from an accredited law school. Additionally, if not a member of the Ohio Bar the selected candidate must be willing to pursue admission to the Ohio Bar and be willing to obtain admission to practice before the United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio, the United States District Court for the Southern District of Ohio, the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, and the Supreme Court of the United States.

Additionally, applicants must:

- Have exceptional writing skills, and be able to manage difficult, complex litigation.
- Have a strong commitment to addressing the ongoing and underlying disparate treatment of people of color and marginalized communities within the criminal legal system.
- Have a demonstrably firm grasp of the Anti-Terrorism and Effective Death Penalty Act (AEDPA) litigation under 28 U.S.C. § 2254.
